SOMETHING TO ENVY IN "GAY" FREEDOM? by JULIA FEAR

A few years ago, I was informed by a co-worker and friend that Guelph was fast becoming the "gay capital" of Ontario.

I wasn't totally unfamiliar with the gay community, having observed the painful experience of a male friend "coming out of the closet", a process not unlike the exhaustive struggles of a chick hatching from an egg or a butterfly emerging from a chrysalis.

However, the notion that the University of Guelph might have actually become some sort of homosexual mecca

came as a shock even to me.

Now, five years later, though I'm still dubious of Guelph's ability to live up to this title, (what with the still strong red-neck contingent), I'd have to agree that gays have become a decidedly confident voice in university life.

Last semester, in one issue of the Ontarion alone, a homosexual student was offered the opportunity to "Show and Tell" with the support of other gays at a Guelph Gay Equality meeting, was encouraged to relieve his or her distress by calling the Gayline, and was invited to a Gay

Dance to be held in town at the U.E.W. hall.

The last person I expected to be at the dance was me. Yet, there I was, having been invited by a friend who was a friend of several gay students on campus. Since I happen to be of the heterosexual persuasion, I approached the evening with trepidation, though refusal to go never occurred to me. I just figured it was time to put my money where my liberal mouth was.

Do you want to know what it's like to see men slow dancing with other men? To see women fondling and kissing one another? I'll bet that even those people who think it's the epitome of depravity wouldn't mind a little peep through

the curtain.

At fist, you feel self-conscious because you want to rubber-neck like crazy, but don't want to appear overly inquisitive, which of course, you are. Then, as the evening progresses, you begin to notice that nobody seems to care whether you're watching them or not. Later, if you're open to the idea, you might begin to envy them their freedom realizing that it's you who are imprisoned by your attitude

toward their sexuality.

What dawned on me was the difference between the traditional male-female dances I'd been to and this gathering Here, men danced with men, women with women and men with women, unrestricted and unthreatened. In the more traditional social setting I had always noticed an implied undercurrent of violence. Here, there was a liberation and true "gaiety".

There are numerous theories as to the causes and effects of homosexuality, all of which likely contain some validity and worth. However, it occurred to me at that dance that if humans were to evolve into androgenous beings, it would

not necessarily be the end of the world.

In fact, it might even prevent it.
