
GGE ELECTIONS AT HAND

DIALOGUE ON HOMOPHOBIA CONFERENCE REPORT

The dialogue on Homophobia Conference was held on Feb. 18-20, sponsored by the Gay/Non-gay Coalition of Guelph. The conference began on Friday night with a presentation of videotapes and films on Gay issues and lifestyles, to a full house of over 80 women, men and children too! One of the major points raised about the presentation was that even in 1983 there are still very few films available which give a complete and representative picture of Lesbians and Gay men and our lives.

Following a keynote address by Laura on Saturday morning, we spent a short time massaging each

others backs to get more relaxed. Then a panel of Gay and Non-gay women and men, set out to identify Homophobia. The sources of Homophobia were revealed to be: Religious, Secret Fear of Being Homosexual, Repressed Envy, Threat to Society's Values and Existance Without Vicarious Immortality - i.e. Children.

Panel members explored the role of Homophobia in their own lives, including the oppression of Gays by themselves and abuses of heterosexual privilege.

Following this, quest speakers took the floor. Barry from Windsor traced the roles of women and men in the changing face of society from the Middle Ages, from an agricultural feudal society. through the industrial revolution, to modern society. Carol and Mariruth examined some of myths which have been perpetuated the Church and Medical professions to justify oppression of Homosexual women and

After lunch on Saturday, role reversal skits and discussion were used to look at the ways that male privilege. power. Heterosexual privilege work to deprive Gays and in particular. women, of the freedom to participate as equals in society. The concept that men and Non-gays (as oppressors of women and gay-men) accountable for oppression even though they as individuals are not responsible for setting up the system which oppresses, was delved into. Privilege is power which you are born with as a man or as a heterosexual.

Afternoon workshops examined Lesbianism and Feminism, the role of Gays in Non-gay movements, Gays in the family structure and confronting personal fears in dealing with Homosexuality. Saturday night saw our second Pink Triangle Dance a big success, with over 250 people in attendance.

On Sunday, one workshop examined divisions within the Gay community - the issues of social vs. political focus, being "out" vs. "in the closet", and involvement of Lesbians in predominantly gay-male organizations. The second workshop, "Supporting Gays", allowed gays and non-gays to look at ways for non-gays to be supportive of gays in our struggle.

After lunch, the Conference concluded with skits on dealing with Homophobia among family and friends. There were workshop reports and many comments from the participants.

The conference brought together a large number of Non-gay people for the first time, to look at gay issues. There were also parents of Gays present. Although time was too short to achieve all of the goals of the conference, the Gay/Non-gay Coalition hopes to use this experience to help other communities organize similar events.
