




kinds of discrimination they face daily, a spokesman for a homosexual lobby group said Thursday (May 12).

John Duggan, co-ordinator of Gays of Ottawa, was commenting on a Commons debate Wednesday on a bill designed to give homosexuals and heterosexuals equal protection in the Canadian Human Rights Act.

Some Progressive Conservative MPs opposed attempts by the government and New Democratic Party to send the bill to the Commons justice committee for study. The opposition effectively removed any chance for the bill getting passed or even debated again.

"It's a shame we are still having to argue for human rights at this point," Duggan said in an interview. "The government should have amended the Human Rights Act

Gordon Fairweather, human rights commissioner, has recommended such a change himself.

According to New Democrat Svend Robinson, who sponsored the private member's bill, and a Tory ally, Vancouver-Centre MP Pat Carney, up to two million Canadians are homosexual and could benefit from the bill.

Duggan said homosexual groups must concentrate more on changing public attitudes than on lobbying individual MPs.

THE TOOTSIE ROLE

The smash success of Dustin Hoffman's drag role in Tootsie makes a lot of sense to at least one California behavioral scientist. Dr. Herbert Z. Francelli, who recently expounded at length to the National Examiner on his theory that everyone has a deepseated desire to switch sexual identities. Here are some of his more pithy observations: "we would all like to change sexual identity, if not actual gender, even the most macho and feminine among us. The movie Tootsie permits us to live the experience vicariously through an actor, Dustin Hoffman. And that, of course, is the very safest way...a surprising number of men - executives to truck drivers - secretly wear frilly feminine underthings to work and to social gatherings under their outer clothing. Yet these are people whose romantic relationships are absolutely heterosexual. The phenomenon is more common than you might expect - especially here in California." Is that what is meant by the state of androgyny?
