Give out free condoms to the poor, group urges

under the AIDS shadow



EQUAL RIGHTS AND FREE CONDOMS In a package of recommendations designed in part to fight AIDS, the Ontario Public Health Association during its annual meeting in November endorsed strong and insightful resolutions, "aimed at making Canada a more healthy society." Recommendations included free condoms to the poor, giving the same legal rights to homosexual spouses as those enjoyed by heterosexual couples, limited anonymous HIV testing, condoms and clean needles for prison inmates, and expanded home care for people with AIDS. Joan Anderson, president of the Canadian AIDS Society and a member of The Toronto Star 112189 the PHA suggested that these are realistic and possible recommendation.

SPECIAL THANKS Mary and Larry Jones, the founders of Parent and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) in Brampton were in Guelph in November and spoke at a GGE meeting. The meeting was attended by about 60 people including 3 members who were accompanied by their parents. Mary and Larry said that this was the largest gay group they have spoken to outside of an engagement with Lesbian and Gay Youth in Toronto. The Jones look forward to coming to Guelph every year and they are certainly well received. It was, for many (all) a warm, dynamic, informative, and supportive evening and we look forward to sharing the experience again next year. On June 10, 1990 Mary and Larry have been invited back to the University of Guelph to speak to a symposium directed toward health care professionals.

Once again I would like to thank the Jones, the parents who attended and all the people who came out - it was great!

AIDS COMMITTEE The Aids Committee of Guelph & Wellington County is a community based service established to provide educational and support resources for persons affected by HIV/AIDS in Guelph & Wellington County.

Our office hours are Monday to Friday 9 am to 5 pm. Counselling and educational materials are available including library reference books, brochures and referral services. The AIDS Committee also has a speaker bureau available to interested community groups. Support services provide direct client services on an individual or groups basis, utilizing staff and trained volunteers to meet the practical and emotional needs of our client population. Volunteers are involved as "buddies" who are matched on a one to one basis with clients or as practical assistants to clients. Future plans include a Body Positive Group for individuals who want to learn how to cope more effectively with testing positive.

Body Positive Groups

The support program of the AIDS Committee of Guelph and Wellington County will be offering a Body Positive Discussion Support Group for individuals who want to learn how to cope more effectively with testing positive. The group will run weekly for eight sesions with attendance limited to ten members, plus two facilitators.


