

Kitchener-Waterloo has its own extra special people. Lisa is one of them. Two years ago she co-founded WOODS (Women Out Of Doors) in KW. A year later, she saw another need in the community. Plenty of gay and lesbian events were held each month, including GLLOW events, women's dances, WOODS events and events sponsored by the AIDS organizations. But each group had to reach the community on its own, and events-goers had no one place they could go to find out what was going on. So Lisa conceived of a gay community calendar serving "the triangle"-KW, Guelph and Cambridge. "It just seemed really necessary," she says. You guessed it-you're reading it now.

At the same time, our other special person was involved with GLLOW, and recognizing the same needs. "I had a great vision of a gay and lesbian drop-in centre," says Karen, that would serve the larger community, not just students. Her vision is still unfulfilled, but a gay community calendar was another way to bring "all the diverse groups in the community together."

When Lisa and Karen put their heads together, the Pink Triangle Community Calendar was born. More than anything else, putting the calendar together is an organizational task—gathering events, keeping track of advertising and subscribers, updating the general notices, and getting it to and from the typesetter in time to "run, literally, to the photocopier" to get it out on time. Collectively, it takes the two women about 20-30 hours a month to put the PTCC in your hands.

Circulation has grown from about 100 to 250 in the little over a year the PTCC has been publishing. Copies are being sent to the Canadian Gay Archives—yes, KW does have a place in Canadian gay history.

Both women are involved in the community in other ways as well. Both are pastpresidents of GLLOW. Karen is a member of the KYDE Dance Cooperative, a group that puts on dances every three or four months to raise money for women's groups (their latest dance was October 26).

Lisa was formerly involved with the Gay Community Dance Committee in Toronto. She continues to coordinate WOODS in KW, which involves production of another newsletter and coordination of 2 to 4 monthly events. In 1984, she organized a Canadian Gay Mensa group which is still in operation. "I guess I just get into starting things," she says. But she doesn't just start things, Lisa keeps them going.




