

Community Spotlight: Mostly Organic Juice Bar Café

Mostly Organic is one of my favourite spots in downtown Kitchener. Their diverse menu includes freshly squeezed juices, fruit smoothies and over 50 healthy cocktails. Any meat used at Mostly Organic is hormone and chemical free and they boast an excellent vegan and vegetarian menu as well. Favourites on the menu include: soups, stews, wraps, salads, pizza and their famous home made veggie burgers.

On July 14, 2002, the City of Kitchener and the Kitchener Downtown Business Association awarded the Innovative Retailer Service Award to Mostly Organic. I decided to pop in and talk to owners Kathy Frey and Della Baczyk about Pride and being visible members of the local LGBT community.

The bright and cheerful café was opened because Kathy saw a need for "a place for community and healing, a place for people to relax in." Mostly Organic's mission statement certainly spells it out: to support one's enhancement and maintenance of "Personal Quality of Life" by offering "Healthy Choices" and "Availability of Options for Wellness" in turn promoting a more Stable and Balance Society and thus a Rippling Benefit to All!

Being an LGBT-friendly business provides them with a diverse and eclectic clientele that come from all spectrums of life. On any given day, you find an engaging mix of people in the café including transgendered individuals. It's the variety that makes things interesting for this couple.

Kathy and Della both contribute time and energy locally because they feel that it is very important to "bring everyone together, providing a space to feel comfortable in". Mostly Organic allows various groups to use their space to facilitate workshops, hold poetry readings, drum circles and other meetings. They also hold a "dance night" on

the last Saturday of the month for those who want to enjoy a "smoke and alcohol free" environment. In fact, their posters promote the night as "for those who don't think so young yet still want to move to the beat!!"

Over a fragrant chai, I asked Kathy and Della what they would like see changed about our local LGBT communities. Both said that it would be nice to see the pettiness put aside and have people focus on what's good for our community. However, both women were quick to point out that our local community does indeed have a dedicated core group. "Those who work together are very committed. They all have a single goal

in mind: to pull the community together."

What does Pride mean to Kathy and Della, as LGBT-friendly business owners? "Pride is a time to come out and come together. It's an affirmation of who and what we are and that we truly do belong. Pride is a time to celebrate our differences rather than be divided by them. It's about acceptance, unity and getting along with one another."

For a quick shot of positive energy, good food, good times and good tunes pop into Mostly Organic Juice Bar Café, one of Kitchener's hidden gems.

FILM REVIEW: Sexual Chaos?

Director Monika Treut's Female Misbehavior is a collection of four 20-minute documentaries. each of which profiles a woman notable for the creation and control of her own sexual identity.

The film opens with Dr. Paglia, starring Camille Paglia, the selfproclaimed "bisexual lesbian who's also monastic, celibate, a pervert, a deviant, and a voyeur." In her on-camera conversations. Paglia rails against modern feminism, which she sees as merely a relapse into the Puritanism of 17th-century New England. For Paglia, it is obvious that Woman is the dominant sex. and the anti-intellectualism and

feminist movements disgust her. In her view, such movements have degenerated into a reliance on empty slogans.

Paglia, a staunch advocate of pornography, does not hesitate to give vent to her opinions - or her anger. But this anger is fuelled by brilliance and tempered with eloquence. She is neither an upstart nor a reactionary; rather, she is a revolutionary and an intellectual, possessing both a fiery energy and a formidable mind.

Female Misbehavior's second short film is entitled Annie. It's a

victim mentality of contemporary

profile of Ellen Steinberg, aka Annie Sprinkle, a porn actress, stripper, and performance artist whose act is characterized by humour, glamorous spectacle, and audience interaction. She reminds me of Mae West, if Mae West had been a porn star. However, I don't think Mae West ever inserted a speculum into her vagina, opened it, then passed out flashlights so audience members could take turns examining her cervix! Annie Sprinkle is one crazy dame, but it's apparent throughout the film that the creation of this highly sexualized persona, and all the ribald things she does, are entirely her choices.

The third film in the collection is entitled Bondage, and presents us with Carol Macho, a lesbian sado-masochist who expounds upon the value of exhibitionism and shock tactics. She feels there's nothing wrong with "flashing a tit every once in a while." The most interesting aspects of Bondage, however. are not the shots of black leather against naked flesh (though I'm not complaining), but Carol's casual elaborations upon her personal S & M experiences and her views on sex in general. Female Misbehavior closes with Max, a documentary on Max Valerio (formerly Anita Valerio). Max speaks with frankness and humour about his journey from girlhood to manhood, outlining the emotional, physical, and even financial dynamics of gender transformation. He has nothing but praise for the FTM (Female To Male) Organization, a support group

a titillating catch-phrase designed to sell the movie to straights. Treut's documentaries are unified not by chaos, but by an unprecedented sense of sexual clarity. Unlike most people, the individuals in this film know exactly what's good for them.


Hopefully, a table at the local Pride Weekend will raise awareness of the group to other bears in the area.
