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

Pride Workshops A Success!

For those of you who like to discuss issues of pertinence to our local GLBT community, your WWRP Committee hosted a series of educational workshops of constructive sharing. They took place in the comfortable and "safe" surroundings of the Conestoga Room at the Kitchener City Hall.

Committee member Rick Sickinger was the initial driving force for the workshops. They were planned and co-ordinated by Vice President Kathy Frey. Coffee and doughnuts were provided by Tim Horton's.

Workshops were well attended with different participants coming for the different topics that were featured during the day. Given that transgendered issues are still negatively received in some gay and lesbian circles, it was especially pleasing that Roberta Robinson's discussion about transgendered issues had the highest attendance.

Barbara and John Butters of Guelph represented PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays). The group discussed the strengths and weaknesses of straight and GLBT relationships with family members.

Guelph marriage and family therapist Dave Vervoort explored the resources or lack thereof available for the GLBT community in this area. Factors affecting LGBT people and their associates include fundamentalist religious traditions, the corporate and business worlds, government and homo/trans/lesbophobia.

"Unitarians and the LGBT Community" was hosted by Lee Dickey and Lee Horton of the Waterloo Unitarians. Unitarians incorporate commonalities of all the world's religions as a guide for living. No one is expected to conform to a single set of norms, and different religions are used to facilitate that growth. The validity of one's personal experience is stressed so the Unitarian Universalist congregations tend to be places of welcome and acceptance for GLBT persons.

Patti Moses of Anselma House presented "Abuse in Lesbian Relationships". Anselma House and its Cambridge sister Haven House provide a 24-hour crisis support line and safe shelter, support groups, and one-on-one support, children's programs, and public education presentations. Interpreters are available.

Roberta Robinson hosted "Learning about Transgendered Issues." We could have heard a pin drop in the room as Roberta proceeded to talk about her personal life from early childhood to the present. Having lived openly as a woman for the past seven years, she was happy to tell us all the ups and downs in her life to help someone else who might not have to go through the same thing in the same way and to educate the rest of us about the transgendered reality.

The day concluded with a spectacular slide-tape presentation from ACCKWA (The Aids Committee of Cambridge, Kitchener, and Waterloo Association). Safe sex fatigue is a danger with youth becoming tired of constantly hearing about AIDS and the "safety" of taking the cocktail. A new AIDS campaign from AIDS Vancouver will hopefully reach as many people as possible.

Aussie Tough Guy's Single Foray Into Man-Love

The last two films to win the Best Picture Oscar were *Gladiator* (2000) and *A Beautiful Mind* (2001), both starring that strapping Australian man's man, Russell Crowe. A-list actor Crowe, who lives and works on his own ranch, has a tough-guy image and is known as something of a womanizer. He's the epitome of an old-fashioned straight guy, a kind of 21st century Humphrey Bogart.

So, imagine my pleasure and surprise when I came across The Sum of Us, a 1994 Australian production in which Crowe plays a 24-year old gay man who lives with his father. The movie's focus is the relationship between Jeff (Crowe) and his dad Harry (Jack Thompson), and it's not the type of relationship one might expect to see. Harry, a widower who is currently consulting a dating agency, is all man, as straight as they come. Yet, he is not only tolerant of his son's homosexuality, he is entirely accepting of it, and he involves himself in Jeff's life like any father would. The main problem in this father-son dynamic is that Harry is

a bit too nosy when it comes to Jeff's love life.

When it comes to Jeff's romantic endeavors, many of his motivations stem from a childhood memory of his grandmother. As a boy, he happened upon his Gran in bed with her female companion, the two women wrapped sleeping in each other's arms. The sight of them was the most natural thing in the world to Jeff, and he says of it, "It looked like love." Years later, it is this idea of love that he tries to re-create and apply to his own life.

Throughout the movie, both Jeff and Harry address the camera directly, a device borrowed from the play by David Stevens on which the film is based. Used in films, this device can often be awkward and distancing, but these scenes are written and acted confidently enough to actually draw the viewer a little deeper in. The story's filled with frank humour, tenderness, and lots of cool Aussie

slang. Did you know that a gay virgin is a 'woolly woofter'?

As far as sex is concerned, this one's not explicit at all. You do get to see Russell Crowe's ass for a second, but those of you hoping to see him bent over and taking it like a man will be disappointed.

The Sum of Us is available on VHS but, alas, the studio is currently not producing this title on DVD.





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2002 Committee Awards Presented at Pride Day

Each year, the Waterloo-Wellington Regional Pride Committee takes the time to recognize those special individuals and groups that make a difference in our GLBT community.

In 2001, the Waterloo-Wellington Regional Pride Committee recognized four groups last year with community service awards: GLOW (University of Waterloo), GLOBAL (University of Wilfred Laurier), Muses Cafe and Mostly Organic Juice Bar Café.

This year, the Waterloo-Wellington Regional Pride Committee opened the Award Nomination Process to members of the community at large.

The criteria for the nominations this year was very simple: the individual or group must live/have lived in Waterloo-Wellington County, must be supportive of the GLBT community and must have made a positive contribution to the local GLBT community.

Awards were presented on Sunday, June 9 during our local Pride Celebrations on Roos Island in Kitchener's fabulous Victoria Park.

Here are the recipient's of the 2002 Committee Awards:

Gregory (Greg) Cassidy was a Residence Don at the University of Waterloo and active with student government as well as an undergraduate in Environmental Science. In 1991 he was elected to the ACCKWA Board of Directors. Between 1991 and 1993, he served as Vice President and President.

Greg also sat on the Board of KW Oktoberfest and on the Board of the Waterloo Public Library, where he was instrumental in the *AdoptaMagazine* program (Chair in 1993). Greg worked as Circulation Manager for the Waterloo Chronicle (1983-1993) and was pursuing a Masters of Library Science at the University of Toronto. In 1994, he was named Class President.

Greg Cassidy died December 5, 1995, of complications due to AIDS. The Toronto Faculty of Library Sciences has since named a new computer lab after Greg.

The Robin's Nest is located in Cambridge at 26 Hobson Street and is open on Saturdays. The Robin's Nest is one of the area's longest running GLBT establishment boasting more than 20 years of service to the local community. Operating as a private members club open to members and their guests, Annie Nixon and the Robin's Nest have continued to provide a safe and enjoyable atmosphere for the GLBT community.

Bread and Roses Co-operative Homes, a 66 unit federal program Housing Co-operative in Kitchener's downtown core houses people and families of all types as a democratically run member-driven corporation entering their fifteenth year of operation. Based in an adapted historic site with a six-story tower, Bread and Roses has long been a supporter of the local LGBT communities.

When Bread and Roses was in the planning stages, the original Board of

Directors entered into an agreement with the AIDS Committee of Cambridge, Kitchener, Waterloo and Area to continually house a minimum of two families/people living with HIV/AIDS. To date, more than \$250,000.00 of Rent Geared to Income subsidies for persons with HIV/AIDS has been administered.

Bread and Roses Co-op is the only Housing Co-operative with this type of agreement in the Central Ontario Cooperative Housing Federation (covering the cities of Kitchener, Waterloo, Guelph, Cambridge and Brantford).

Scott N. Schau has played an active role in our community for several years. He was involved with the local Pride Committee from 1997 to 2000, and was very heavily involved from 1998 to 2000 when he served as Chair of the Committee. He has also been the organizing force behind the Rainbow Community Conversation Group over the last few years. Scott N. Schau was also one of the artists featured in the WWRP's Art Show and Exhibition this year.

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
