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



Fostering Families: Foster Care an Option for LGBTQ

FEATURE



Foster parents come in all shapes and sizes. Some are single parents, some are married or living with a common-law spouse. Some don't have children or are older and their children have moved away. You don't have to be a parent, but it helps to have had some experience with children. We subscribe to the Ontario Human Rights Code and do not discriminate foster parents on basis of age (though over 18 is a must), gender, sexual orientation or marital status.

In addition to affection, supervision and guidance, foster parents take on the responsibility to provide stability, structure and consistency for their foster children. Patience, compassion, optimism, humour, and understanding are all assets that contribute to a loving, nurturing environment for a child. The desire to help a child, an understanding of the needs of children and a demonstrated willingness to learn are all essential in building a relationship with a foster child.

A child may be separated from their



own parents for various reasons and require temporary or long-term care. Foster parents provide a nurturing, healthy and safe environment for a child to grow and develop. Foster children come from a variety of ethnic and racial backgrounds and range in age from infancy to 16 years. Foster care is intended to be temporary. This means that we work in specified periods of time towards the goal of helping the child and their family to get back together. It is a team approach, working together with the child, family and social workers to obtain this goal.

To provide a safe home for a child is to make some big inroads in their life. A foster parent might be the largest influence in the child's life. Foster parents may be helping the child to break the destructive patterns which may include physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse, or neglect. Foster families provide the full spectrum of vital support for children faced with social, behavioral, spiritual and emotional deficits.

Why foster a child?

- to enhance personal
- · to improve the quality of life for a child
- to work as part of a multi-disciplinary team with the goal of returning a child to their family
- to meet new people with similar interests



Perhaps you know a family who provides foster care and are interested in providing the same service. Maybe you know someone that was a foster child, or were a foster child yourself. You may be

aware of the need for foster families and want to help.

Challenges and Rewards

Children placed in care often have emotional and behavioral challenges. In addition, the foster families often find it difficult to let go when a child returns home.

The rewards are plentiful! As a foster family, you have the opportunity to make a difference in the life of a child and provide a very necessary service to the community. You will enhance your knowledge of child development, child care needs and how to respond to them through work with a multi-disciplinary team of professionals.

Be sure you get the chance to visit one of the venues listed here. The tour is truly something to be seen.



Man, I feel like a woman

In the life drawing classes I teach, students often ask me if they'll be drawing a male or female model. And usually, it's an easy question to answer -- with the exception of one model, Douglas Morton, who is transgender.

Interested in learning about transgender issues, I spent some time speaking with Morton after our life drawing session this past week at the Waterloo Community Arts Centre.

"Transgender is an umbrella term for anyone who identifies or presents in a way that crosses the gender line," said Morton. "(People in the transgender community) are way too different from each other to be understood as being one identity. I identify as a woman who is male. I dress in ways that feel right, which is generally in women's clothes, and I ask to be referred to as 'she' and 'her' and generally to be treated as a female."

Morton explained she doesn't have

any plans to change anything about herself with regards to her body, her perspective or her name.

"(Douglas) is the name I was given by my parents, and it has significance for me," said Morton. "It means 'dark water,' which is very feminine symbolism and it is also quite fitting -- I tend to be deep. My last name means 'living on or near a marsh,' so my name literally means 'dark water near a marsh' -- how could I change that? I have also discovered that (Douglas) was a girl's name until the 17th century.

"The only reason I can think of for changing my name to a feminine name is to fit into culture. And really, with the way I identify, I'm never going to fit in anyway."

Morton said it was in October 2006. at the age of 31, when she figured out she was a transgender woman.

"A year before, I had suffered severe depression to the point of being suicidal and requiring hospitalization before I did anything drastic," said Morton. "I took that as a sign that I should figure out what was wrong, and so I did some soul




searching, and looked into gender and other areas that seemed to be the source of the discomfort."

And once she came to the realization she could be a woman, while remaining biologically male, she began telling people. "It was the most terrifying experience in my life," said Morton. "But every time I told someone, I felt immense relief and jov."

"It is important to recognize if someone informs you they are transgender, they are taking a significant risk, and showing a great amount of trust in you," said Morton. "Also realize they are the same person, and simply expressing a new part of themselves. I believe we all need to support each other in expressing our true selves."

Morton added that people often assume that being transgender is a choice. "Let me tell you, no one would choose this," said Morton. "We only have the choice to accept what we are, or live in misery hiding ourselves."

Pastor Credited With Canadian Gay Marriage Win **Receives Highest National Honour**

Longtime Canadian LGBT civil rights activist Rev. Brent Hawkes will be invested Feb 22 into the Order of Canada by the Queen's representative. The Order of Canada is the country's highest civilian honor.

Hawkes has been on the front line of gay activism in Canada for decades. For more than 30 years he has been the senior pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church of Toronto.

In 2001 under considerable publicity he conducted a double wedding for two same-sex couples at the church and then went to court when the

province of Ontario refused to register the marriages.

He performed the wedding ceremony for Kevin Bourassa & Joe Varnell and Elaine & Anne Vautour, wearing a bulletproof vest on the advice of police and following a series of threats from socially conservative activists.

To conduct the ceremony without marriage licenses - something that had been denied gay couples -Hawkes found a loophole in the law. It allowed the ancient Christian practice of Publishing Bannes.

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







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
