How Safe Do You Feel in Waterloo Region?

It can be an incredibly liberating experience going to a large Pride Parade. I remember the thrill of going to my first Pride celebration in San Francisco in 1986, and then over the next dozen years attending Pride celebrations in Toronto. For a period of several hours you feel "normal" - but then you get back to everyday life in Waterloo Region.

Over the past few decades it has become much easier for LGBTQ folks to come out to friends, school-mates, family and co-workers. It is now commonplace to hear some people in our community say that we have achieved integration into Canadian society, and we don't need special events, dance clubs, bars or organizations for the local rainbow community.

If we are truly integrated, it follows that we should feel safe. But how safe do you really feel here?

Are you safe if you have to make accommodations for fear of emotional, verbal or physical abuse?

Are you safe if you have to hide who you are with members of your extended family, who pester you with questions suggesting that you are cis-gendered or heterosexual?

Are you safe if you feel that you have to conceal your identity when a stranger

visits your home, for example, to deliver plumbing services or home care?

What about when you visit your health professional or the hospital?

Do you pretend that your partner is your friend or a relative when you are arranging some joint purchase (like a home or an automobile), making a joint financial investment or preparing your wills?

Can you imagine being transparent about who you are in a retirement home or a long-term care facility - with both the staff and the other residents?

What about showing affection with a friend or partner of the same sex on the street or in a shopping mall - would you feel comfortable holding hands or exchanging a kiss the way many straight people feel entitled to do?

Being out to people you know fairly well is one thing - but being transparent about who you are in the presence of strangers is something completely different. I still remember that one of the goals that we had back in the early 1970s was for people in our community to be comfortable being open about who we were. In my opinion we are not quite there yet.
